## Quality and Qualifications Ireland (QQI) established 2012

- Formed by a merger of 4 legacy agencies:
  - **FETAC** (Further Education and Training Awards Council) responsible for external quality assurance, programme validation and certification in Vocational Education and Training
  - **HETAC** (Higher Education and Training Awards Council responsible for external quality assurance, programme validation and certification in Higher Education public Institutes of Technology (Universities of Applied Sciences) and private higher education providers
  - **IUQB** (Irish Universities Quality Board) responsible for external institutional-level quality assurance of public universities
  - **NQAI** (National Qualifications Authority of Ireland) responsible for the National Qualifications Framework (NFQ) and NARIC Ireland



## **QQI functions** (84 staff - annual budget of €12m)

- External quality assurance of public universities and private higher education providers
- Programme validation and certification of private higher education providers
- External quality assurance, programme validation and certification of public Education and Training Boards (further education and training FET/VET)
- External quality assurance, programme validation and certification of private FET providers



## **QQI functions** (84 staff - annual budget of €12m)

- Maintenance and promotion of the National Qualifications Framework (NFQ)
- NARIC Ireland provide recognition 'advice' for Irish and overseas qualifications
- National Europass Centre
- Awarding (from 2024) of International Education Mark (*TrustedEd Ireland*) to private English Language Education providers and higher education providers
- Responsible for monitoring academic integrity guarding against contract cheating

## Summary of Irish Higher Education Population of Ireland - 5.1m in 2023

- 7 public universities (c. 145,000 students in 2023)
- 5 Technological universities (c. 91,500 students)
- 1 private medical and health sciences university (c. 5,000 students)
- 2 Institutes of Technology (c. 7,000 students)
- 3 teacher training/arts colleges (c. 8,000 students)
- c. 25 small private higher education colleges (c. 25,000 students)



## **Ireland – tertiary attainment**

### **OECD – Education at a glance 2023**

- In Ireland, the level of tertiary attainment among **25-64 year-olds** is one of the highest among OECD and partner countries with available data. (**54.4 %, rank 3/46**, 2022)
- In Ireland, the level of tertiary attainment among 25-34 year-olds is one of the highest among OECD and partner countries with available data. (63.3 %, rank 4/45, 2022)
- In Ireland, the share of **25-34 year-olds** who attained a **bachelor's or equivalent tertiary education degree** is one of the highest among countries with available data. (**36 %, rank 4/44**, 2022)
- In Ireland, the share of **25-34 year-olds** who attained a **doctoral or equivalent tertiary education degree** is one of the highest among countries with available data. (**1.5 %, rank 4/35**, 2022)



## **QQI QA functions in HE and FET**

- Public universities (7) are self-accrediting: QQI is responsible for periodic institutional quality review
- Public technological universities (5) are self-accrediting: QQI is responsible for periodic institutional quality review
- Public institutes of technology (2) are self-accrediting: QQI is responsible for periodic institutional quality review
- Private higher education providers (c. 25) do not have their own awarding powers: QQI is responsible for programme validation and certification and periodic institutional quality review
- Public Education and Training Boards (16) (further education and training FET/VET) do not have their own awarding powers: QQI is responsible for programme validation and certification and periodic institutional quality review
- Private FET/VET (c. 170) providers do not have their own awarding powers: QQI is responsible for programme validation and certification and periodic institutional quality review



## HE institutional quality review cycles

**Cycle1 (EUA-IEP) 2004-05**: IUQB commissioned EUA IEP to undertake quality reviews of the 7 public universities

**Cycle 2 (IRIU) 2009-12**: IUQB undertook Institutional review of the 7 public universities

**Cycle 2: 2008-12**: HETAC undertook institutional review of 13 institutes of technology and c. 20 private HE providers

**Cycle 3: (CINNTE) 2017-24**: QQI undertook/are undertaking institutional reviews of the 7 public universities, 1 private Medical University, 1 National University, 6 institutes of technology, 5 technological universities and the 4 largest private HE providers

## **QQI** monitoring

- QQI undertakes institutional review of self-accrediting universities every 7 years or so
- To compensate for this infrequency, QQI undertakes additional monitoring of universities via:
  - <u>Annual Quality Reporting</u> (two–part report compliance and enhancement, published on QQI website)
  - Bi-annual Quality Dialogue Meetings (QQI visits the universities and meets with senior management every two years)



## Analysis of Quality Assurance at QQI





### **QQI** research and innovation

- QQI established a separate Research and Innovation Division (RID) in 2021 (with 3 full-time staff)
- QQI commissions, for example, an annual synoptic overview of the AQRs of the public higher education institutions and publishes this as part of our <u>QQI insights</u> reports


## Irish National Framework of Qualifications (NFQ)

- QQI is responsible for the maintenance, promotion, further development and implementation of the NFQ
- All public tertiary (HE and VET) education institutions are required to have their qualifications included in the NFQ
- The NFQ, from its inception, has contained **Major awards** Bachelor, Master's, Doctoral degrees but also contains smaller awards termed **Minor, Supplemental and Special-Purpose Awards**



10-level Irish National Framework of Qualifications (NFQ) – established 2003

One of the first frameworks to be established





## Irish National Framework of Qualifications (NFQ)

- All **Minor awards** are single modules which can be completed and certified individually. All minor awards are linked to a major award and can be stacked towards gaining a major award.
- **Supplemental awards** are awards that recognise learning concerned with updating, upskilling or continuing education and training
- Special Purpose awards are developed for specific areas of learning that have a narrow scope
- Minor, supplemental and special purpose awards therefore already share characteristics of what are now termed **micro-credentials**



## Irish Register of Qualifications (IRQ.ie)

- All programmes (major and non-major) that lead to awards in the NFQ are included in the Irish Register of Qualifications (IRQ) which is maintained by QQI
- The IRQ is searchable so that, for instance, all NFQ higher education awards of ≤30 ECTS credits (the domain of 'micro-credentials') can be viewed in the IRQ



### **Micro-credentials in the NFQ**

- All qualifications in the NFQ have a level associated with them
- This allows the learner to understand how the learning in a microcredential compares to a Bachelor degree at Level 8 in the 10-level NFQ
- The volume of learning, say 10 ECTS credits, allows the learner to compare that with a 4-year Bachelor degree which is 240 ECTS
- All qualifications in the NFQ (including micro-credentials) must undergo quality assurance procedures according to the ESG (Standards and Guidelines for Quality Assurance in the European Higher Education Area)







## **Qualifications Recognition at QQI**

The NARIC Ireland database has over 1700 qualifications from more than 160 countries and allows a student to download a **comparability statement** that compares their academic qualification to an Irish qualifications of a similar major award type and level on the Irish NFQ.

A comparability statement only provides advice and is not a legal document.

Decisions on recognising a qualification for employment or educational purposes are made by the individual employer or education provider admissions staff.

For professional qualifications, decisions on recognition are made by the appropriate Irish professional statutory regulatory body authority for the relevant profession.
